ACADEMIC INTEGRITY IN NORTH AMERICA AND AT HUMBER

Academic integrity may look different in various countries around the world. In the North American cultural context, success is generally attributed to "individualistic and achievement-oriented" accomplishments (Ison, pg. 294). As a result, it is imperative that when someone else's work or ideas are shared, the credit is given to the owner of the work through proper referencing and work citation (Ison, pg. 294).

Whether you are a domestic or an international student, it is very important to have a good understanding of the academic integrity policies of the post-secondary institution you are attending. DEFINITIONS

Cheating - copying someone else's work or allowing someone else to copy your work. This could also include sharing answers during quizzes, tests and exams or looking over someone else's work. Please remember to follow the instructions of professors and invigilators. Using calculators, notes and other assistive aids (except for what you are allowed to use) are all considered forms of cheating. If it is a math (involves numbers) problem, be sure to show your work.

Plagiarism – taking someone else's work without giving them the credit for it. For example, if you copy someone's words verbatim (exact words), be sure to add quotation marks (") around it and add it to your list of references. If you are paraphrasing someone's words/work, be sure to cite it (at the end of the sentence/paragraph paraphrased) and add it to your list of references.

- Familiarize yourself with work citation rules
- When in doubt, cite your source(s), or better yet, cite all sources
- It may be time consuming, but it can save you from unpleasant consequences

Fabrication – intentionally making up data or falsifying information and presenting it as your findings (from research, experiments, lab results, findings, and the like), in order to support your work.





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BEWARE OF GHOSTWRITING AND CONTRACT CHEATING

- **Ghostwriting**: someone completes an assignment for you (without a fee)
- Contract Cheating: paying someone to complete an assignment for you
 - There is no guarantee that the work you're outsourcing is not being sold to other students
 - The penalties could range from having it appear on your transcript to getting expelled from the program or college
 - The effects could be far reaching, which could bar you from getting registered with professional governing bodies (examples include: health, law, business)

ACADEMIC INTEGRITY CHECKLIST

Understand the instructor's requirements for assignments ask whenever in doubt
Keep all research notes, drafts, lab-sheets, outlines and early drafts (you may need to provide it to the Instructor)
Make sure direct quotations are referenced and all ideas from others are referenced with citations
Double check quotes and references are complete and accurate
Paraphrase work from others → reword it in your own terms and language
Check citations for accuracy (page numbers, dates, web page addresses
Use a reference style (double check if there is a preferred style needed for assignments)
Do not share content that is not authorized by instructor
