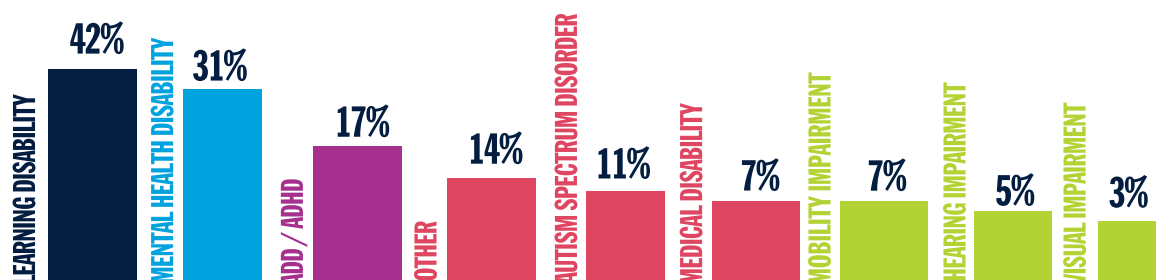

### Survey Respondent Feedback
